

# French Grammar Express- Using Articles

**What is an article?**  
**A little word that is placed before a noun.**

I will buy **a** cake      **indefinite article**  
 → There is no definite information about the cake.

**The** cake I made      **definite article**  
 → A specific cake; the one I made.

I ate **some** cake      **partitive article**  
 → A certain quantity of cake; a part of it

**Golden Rule:** There is **ALWAYS** an article before a noun in French.

**vie (f) = life**    **chocolat (m) = chocolate**    **eau (f) = water**    **chat (m) = cat**

**Definite article (the)**

**life** is beautiful.    I love **chocolate**.    I like **cats**.  
**la vie** est belle.    J'adore **le chocolat**.    J'aime **les chats**.

**Indefinite/partitive article (some)**

Do you want **(some) water**?    I eat **(some) chocolate**.  
 Tu veux **de l'eau**?    Je mange **du chocolat**.

→ If you can use 'some' (implied) in English you **MUST** use it in French.

**Remember de/d'**

**In negative sentences:**

**Indefinite/partitive article (some)**

Je mange **du** chocolat. → Je ne mange **pas de** chocolat.  
 I eat **(some) chocolate**. → I don't eat **(any) chocolate**.

Je prends **de la** salade. → Je ne prends **jamais de** salade.  
 I take **(some) salad**. → I never take **(any) salad**.

J'achète **des** carottes. → Je n'achète **pas de** carottes.  
 I buy **(some) carrots**. → I don't buy **(any) carrots**.

Je bois **de l'** eau. → Je ne bois **pas d'** eau.  
 I drink **(some) water**. → I don't drink **(any) water**.

	Masculine	Feminine	Plural
<b>Indefinite (a, some)</b>	un [ɛ̃]	une [œn]	des [deh]
<b>Definite (the)</b>	le [luh]	la [lah]	les [leh]
	<b>l'</b> [l] before a vowel or h		
<b>Partitive (some of it, some)</b>	du [dœ]	de la [duhlah]	des [deh]
	<b>de l'</b> [duhl] before a vowel or h		
<b>*Negatives : de [duh] or d' [d]</b>
